The Southwestern Medical District is working with the Texas Trees Foundation (TTF) to transform the antiquated Harry Hines corridor into a **vibrant, connected, and safe** multimodal linear parkway with a 10-acre park.

Through a lens of robust engagement, the holistic restructuring will focus on evidence-based design that enhances the environment, uplifts adjoining neighborhoods and businesses, spurs economic development, and nurtures the body, mind, and spirit for the millions of individuals who experience the district annually.
